We explored the concept of doubling by printing butterfly wings and then writing the number sentence to match. We are planning to grow a variety of vegetables and flowers in our garden e.g. carrots, beetroot, fennel, salad, beans, agapanthus. The seeds planted will stay on our warm balcony until we are free of morning frosts and then we can plant our seedlings outdoors. This week our year one children have been making their own planetariums using the boxes they have painted black. Together we've been thinking carefully about the sizes of the planets compared to the sun and which planets are the closest to us.

Thank you to all of you that came to our stargazing event this week. We hope the children enjoyed looking through telescopes to get a closer look at the moon, stars and planets!

Reverend Vivien writes:

Reverend Vivien writes: We are thinking about respect this week. Whom should we respect? Should we respect people because they are older than us? Bigger than us? More important than us? Cleverer than us? Better at sports than us? More beautiful or handsome than us? If we do, it might make us think, 'Oh dear, I'm not as old as they are, not as big as them, not important, not clever, not good at sports, not beautiful or handsome', then think we're no good and have no respect for ourselves. It works the other way round too. Should we respect ourselves because we are older than someone else, bigger than them, more important, cleverer, better at sports, more beautiful or handsome than them? If we do, it might make us think, 'Hmm they are not as old as me, big as me, important as me, clever as me, good at sports as me, beautiful or handsome as me', and decide they're no good and have no respect for them.

Goliath might have thought that about David. But he wasn't right, was he? The story of David and Goliath is in the old part of the bible, the special book which helps us to understand what God means and how to follow Jesus. In another old part of the bible, there are special songs called psalms. In one, the psalm writer says to Father God, You have looked for me and found me, you know me, your hand will guide me wherever I go, it was you who wonderfully made me, your thoughts are precious to me and I will always be with you. The psalm writer is respecting God and giving thanks to God for every good thing about themselves, not claiming the credit themselves. The bible says, don't compare yourself with others. Be glad of every good quality another person has, but don't ever think that makes you not so good as them, and don't look at the things you can do better than others and think that makes you better than them.

Because we're in the season of Lent and thinking seriously about things, we know some people don't think they are any good, and some people make others think they are no good. Don't you be either of those kinds of people. Everyone is really wonderful just for being themselves and no one should make another person believe any different. Once we realise everyone is wonderfully made by God and that we are all beautiful in his eyes, then we can all respect each other, just for this.

In Lent I can have respect for everyone.
